Plenary session | Strengthening competitiveness through the single market

Thirty years on from its creation, the single market remains Europe's most powerful economic lever, yet its potential remains unfulfilled. What began as a bold vision to eliminate borders and spur integration is increasingly bogged down by internal fragmentation and shifting political priorities.

Focusing on the gap between ambition and delivery, the session will address stalled progress across measurable KPIs (e.g. trade integration in goods and services), persistent governance bottlenecks, changing political priorities, and a loss of strategic focus. Enrico Letta will also explore necessary structural reforms, namely across capital, services, and R&D&I, to overcome internal fragmentation, rebuild momentum, and reinforce Europe's global competitiveness.

Plenary session | Electrification: the key to Europe's Competitiveness and security

Recent energy shocks have served as a stark reminder that Europe's reliance on energy imports remains an Achilles' heel for its economic competitiveness, particularly in energy-intensive industries. Electrification offers an opportunity to strengthen Europe's energy security and competitiveness while advancing decarbonisation, but practical barriers, such as lengthy permitting procedures, insufficient grid capacity and investment gaps, continue to hamper progress.

This session will examine how Europe can accelerate the electrification of its economy while maintaining security of supply and ensuring affordability. It will explore the investment needed in generation, grids, storage and flexibility, as well as how stronger cooperation between member states can deliver a more integrated and resilient European electricity system.

Panel session

What does the geopolitical context mean for chambers of commerce and industry?

For centuries, chambers have helped their member companies navigate a range of challenges, ranging from political upheaval, war, or natural disaster to the twin transition or administrative burdens.

European businesses currently find themselves confronted with a complex combination of unfavourable conditions linked to the volatile geopolitical context.

This context is characterised by Russia's unprovoked aggression towards Ukraine, heightened tensions in the Middle East, Transatlantic trade uncertainty, a soaring trade imbalance with China and a multilateral trading order that is under severe strain.

The European response is slow, confused and disjointed, undermined by short-term political expediency at national level and complex, unwieldy EU decision making procedures.

The situation doesn't impact internationally active businesses only, it impacts all of them, regardless of size or sector.

What does this all mean for chambers of commerce and industry? How can they support their member businesses in this context? and, in an increasingly digitalised society and a fast-evolving economy, do they want these services delivered to them differently?

- Itinerary 1: Sustainable competitiveness

The green transition remains a key pillar of Europe's competitiveness and economic resilience. Yet despite recent efforts to simplify legislation, many businesses continue to experience the transition as a source of higher costs, more complex rules and fewer resources available for investment and innovation. This session will explore how Europe can reconcile sustainability with industrial competitiveness and how to turn compliance into a competitive advantage. Bringing together policy experts and the chamber network, the discussion will examine the obstacles businesses face and which policies and support measures are needed to deliver a more business-friendly transition.

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- Itinerary 2: International Trade

It remains important for European competitiveness that businesses are aware of the opportunities and support they have in tapping into the world's leading growth centres. At the same time, the unprecedented geopolitical volatility makes it essential that companies mitigate risks and public administrations ensure a trading environment that addresses unfair competition that increasingly undermines the level playing field for businesses both at home and abroad.

The session will therefore explore what instruments companies have at their disposal at regional, national level and EU level to optimise their competitive position in key global markets, from the United States, to Latin America, Africa and South East Asia, and how chambers can continue to be frontrunners in helping our business succeed globally.
